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#### From the Pastor

The fashion industry is one of the largest money makers in the world. From jeans to diamonds and pearls, your fashion is your statement. Your dress is your address. Style is a statement about who you are and what you stand for, a form of visual and tangible identity that flags the viewer to a specific image you want to create, the way you want to be "viewed" and seen in the world.

Your clothing is your credo.

What you wear on the outside is an indicator of the identity you claim on the inside. As actions reveal motives, so too does your fashion reveal your feelings, your motif, your intentions, your personality, your affiliations, your deeply seeded values and even your faith.

Wearing clothing is an art, and art is a window into the soul. Your clothing can be the cross you wear, or a tattoo you bear, the jewelry and accessories you choose, the hairstyle you comb, the glasses you see though. Even the absence of clothing or accessories makes a statement about who you are and what means something ... (or not)...to you.

Your outward appearance, the "art" of imagining through clothing, is a direct reflection of your inner spirit. Your clothes you could say is the "image" of your spirit, the "fruit" of your roots.

When you make a "fashion" statement, you also make a "spirit statement." Your spirit statement is your true "statement of faith" --in what or whom you put your faith. Your clothing reveals how you live out your faith in the world "for real."

Jesus once told his newly formed apostles that they should "stay in the city until they have been clothed with power from on high."

The clothing we choose reveals the person we are. The clothing we allow God to choose for us, reveals the faith we have and our ability to submit our hearts to "fit" God's mission and ministry.

When we allow God to clothe us with grace and wisdom and love, we become truly immersed within God's Spirit of love and mercy, healing and goodness. We not only change internally, we also change externally, for when people look at us, they see the presence of God all around us and within us! Our actions, the way we behave, will spring from the way we are "clothed."

When you go on a hike or climbing up and down the hills and valleys, you don't go barefoot and in speedos and bikinis. You put on protective clothing: hiking boots, hat, warm vest.

When you work on a building or construction site, you wear steel-tipped shoes, protective eye mask, hard hat, and gloves.

You don't run naked into a fire. But if there are people to be saved, you put on a protective suit, you take a risk, and you run straight head-on into that fire, knowing that your clothing will protect you, so that you can save others.

We are God's fire fighters and lifeguards. We are people on a saving mission that sometimes means that we have to take some risks, walking into the fire, water, wind and waves.

My family in the faith, we need to give God our hands and feet, our mouths and voices, our bodies... our very spirits, and God will clothe us in ways that will change the way people see us and change the way we do ministry.

# Reformation Sunday Is October 29 Please Wear Red!

Reformation Sunday is coming up on October 29th so don't forget to wear red. It's a special day for us as Lutherans to celebrate our faith and the ways God continues to work in and through our church. Wearing red reminds us of the Holy Spirit's power and the boldness we're called to live out every day. It's a time to come together, be proud of our roots, and look forward with hope and purpose.

#### OCTOBER IS LGBTQ+ HISTORY MONTH

As we at Celebration begin our journey toward investigating whether or not we wish to go forward with the process of becoming an official Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation, we thought it might be appropriate during this LGBTQ+ history month, to lift up a trailblazer in this community, especially someone whose orientation you may not have been aware of.

Sally Ride was the first American woman in space, making history on June 18, 1983, and she remains an inspiring figure in science and education.

Sally Kristen Ride was born on May 26, 1951, in Encino, California. She showed an early interest in science and sports, particularly tennis, where she excelled and earned a scholarship to the Westlake School for Girls. After high school, she attended Swarthmore College but later transferred to Stanford University, where she earned a Bachelor of Science in Physics and a Bachelor of Arts in English in 1973. Ride continued her studies at Stanford, obtaining a Master's degree in 1975 and a Ph.D. in Physics in 1978, focusing on the interaction of X-rays with the interstellar medium.

In 1978, Ride was selected as one of the first female astronauts by NASA, joining a group that included only five other women. After completing her training, she became the first American woman to travel to space on June 18, 1983, aboard the Space Shuttle Challenger during the STS-7 mission. This mission involved deploying satellites and conducting scientific experiments, marking a significant milestone for women in science and technology.

Ride flew on a second mission, STS-41G, in 1984, where she again operated the shuttle's robotic arm and contributed to various scientific tasks. Over her career, she spent more than 343 hours in space. After leaving NASA in 1987, she worked at Stanford's Center for International Security and Arms Control and later at the University of California, San Diego, focusing on research and education.

Sally Ride's contributions extended beyond her space missions; she was a passionate advocate for science education, particularly for girls and women. She founded Sally Ride Science, an organization aimed at inspiring young people to pursue careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). Ride also authored several books on science for children, further promoting interest in the field.

Sally Ride died on July 23, 2012, but her legacy as a pioneer for women in space and her commitment to education continue to inspire future generations. Her achievements have reshaped public perceptions of women's roles in science and technology, making her a significant figure in both aerospace history and the fight for gender equality in STEM fields.

In life, Sally Ride became famous as America's first woman in space — and in death, she's now added to her fame as the first acknowledged gay astronaut.

The revelation came in a low-key way: in the obituary from Sally Ride Science, the educational venture she founded. There was a reference to Tam O'Shaughnessy, her partner of 27 years.

Sally Ride's sister, Bear Ride, explained why the former astronaut kept quiet about her sexual orientation.

"In her inherent Norwegian reticence — in this and so many aspects of her personal life (wrestling with pancreatic cancer, for example) — she just didn't talk much (see Norwegian comment, and add to that the typical tight -lipped scientist thing)," Bear wrote. "If you read interviews from years and years back, you'll see that there was always a major frustration that she didn't comment much on 'how it feels to be the first American woman in space' — she just didn't think that way. She wanted to get the job done. Her personal feelings were just that: personal. Not right or wrong — simply Sally. Everyone who knows her well really got that about her."

## Money, Stewardship and Generosity

...From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required, and from the one to whom much as been entrusted, even more will be demanded...`Luke 12:48b

Work-world practices and faith practices are fundamentally opposed to each other. Hours of church volunteer work are more valuable to God then hours of a paid job. In church, stewardship refers to giving the first 10 percent of your income to God.

I hope each of the above statements gives you pause. Are these claims true or false? What does the Bible teach about stewardship of time, talent and material resources.
